

### AP Capstone

Capstone is a 2 year commitment

- AP Capstone is a College Board diploma program based on two courses: AP Seminar and AP Research. Students who complete the two-year program can earn one of two different AP Capstone awards.
  - https://apcentral.collegeboard.org/courses/ap-capstone/how-ap-capstone/e-works
- These courses develop students' skills in research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration, writing, and presenting.
- Students must be at grade-level, demonstrated by a minimum of a C+ in English and History in the most recent semester.
  - No application required
  - Students who take AP Seminar will also take AP Research senior year. This is a 2 year commitment

#### AP vs Honors Class

#### **AP Course**

- ☐ AP = College Level Course
- Opportunity to earn College Credit
- ☐ Final in the Fall/ AP Exam in the Spring (scored 1-5)



#### **Honors**

- Honors = AdvancedLevel Course
- □ Final for each semester

\*Both earn 1 extra grade point per letter grade calculated into student's GPA

### AP/Honors Courses: Update

- Cap Lifted
  - SFHS Administration is piloting the removal of limiting AP/Honors classes next school year
- ☐ Important for your daughter to meet with her counselor to discuss:
  - The rigorous academic demands and time commitment required for H/AP level courses, including summer work
  - ☐ Her outside commitments and extracurricular activities
  - Balance
- Limitations with the Master Schedule
  - ☐ It's very possible there will be schedule conflicts and students may not get all of the H/AP courses they select.

\*It is still recommended that students take no more than 3 H/AP courses per school year.

#### AP/Honors Application Process & Info

- Your daughter received this exact info in Sophomore Advisory
   Today
  - Course description and prerequisites can be found in the Course Catalog (found on the SF Homepage)
  - Each department/course has its own process
    - VP Ms. Moloney outlined the process for each class in a chart emailed out to all students on 12/20/23
- Deadline for applications February 2
  - It is your daughter's responsibility to know the process
- Students will be notified February 23rd regarding decision/waitlists
- □ Apply to any/all AP or Honors courses of interest

### **Academic Rigor**

- The term rigor is used to describe instruction, schoolwork, learning experiences and educational expectations that are academically, intellectually, and personally challenging.
- St. Francis High School does not provide student ranking on transcripts.

Academic rigor is different for each student!

### When requesting classes, remember:

- Your daughter is <u>requesting</u> classes, not registering for them.
- There is no guarantee she will get all of the classes she requests
- There is no such thing as "trying out a class"
  - Be very intentional about choosing classes
- W and WF Policy
  - Drops that occur once the school year has began result in a W on the transcript. Drops that occur after Q1 result in a WF on the transcript.


### Course Registration Process

- Your daughter will receive an email describing how to input her courses into PowerSchool.
- She will also mark which classes she plans to take
   on the Course Registration Form. She can review
   the form with you and have you sign it.
- She will then bring in the signed form during Course Verification Days to the Dining Hall during her free block so a counselor can verify the courses in Powerschool.



### Course Registration Timeline

- Grade concern
- Last day for schedule changes is May 22
  - Schedules mailed in summer are FINAL



#### Community College Course

SFHS plans to offer another ARC course next Fall semester, most likely an Introductory Sociology course. This course will be open to 10-12 grade students and it will be on a first come first serve basis. The course will be capped based on ARC guidelines, 35-40 students per class. ### UC & CSU Eligibility

- California State Universities (CSUs)
  - ☐ GPA in "A-G" college preparatory classes taken in 10th and 11th grades
  - ☐ Minimum gpa is 2.0 in A-G courses to apply
  - Test scores not considered for admission
- University of California schools (UCs)
  - GPA in "A-G" college preparatory classes taken in 10th and 11th grades
  - ☐ Minimum gpa is 3.0 in A-G courses needed to apply
  - Test scores not considered for admission

### A-G Requirements

- ☐ (a): History/Social Science 2 years required
- (b): English 4 years required
  - (c): Mathematics 3 years required, 4 years recommended
  - (d): Laboratory Science 2 years required, 3 years recommended
- (e): Language other than English (LOE) 2 years required, 3 years recommended
  - (f): Visual and Performing Arts (VPA) 1 year required
  - (g): College Preparatory Electives -1 year required (Inter. Dialogue and Economics)

\*UC/CSU calculate their own GPA using grades earned in all A-G courses completed between summer after 9th grade through summer after 11th grade.

<u>Subject requirement (A-G) - UC Admissions - University of California</u>

### Info on Testing



- Junior Year: all Juniors will take PSAT in October
  - You may take your first ACT/SAT Spring Semester of Jr year
  - May offer a School Day SAT or ACT
- Senior Year: Last attempts to take ACT/SAT if desired
- Many colleges and universities have adopted Test Free or Test Optional policies.
  - □ i.e. UC/CSU's are Test Free
  - Some colleges may still require testing for admissions or scholarship opportunities
    - Important to research
